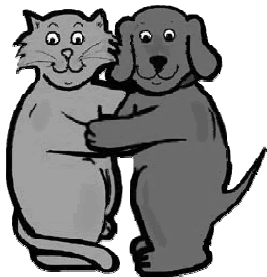


EVACUATION KIT

- * Food and water for at least 7 days, along with bowls, a manual can opener, and utensils if needed
- * Medications and medical and immunization records in a water-proof container. Information on feeding schedules, medical conditions, behavior problems, allergies as well as the name and telephone number of your veterinarian should be included.
- * Pet first aid kit, pet first aid book
- * Sturdy leashes, harnesses, carriers
- * Current photos and descriptions of your pets to help others identify them in case you and your pets become separated. Include pictures of you with your pets to help prove they are yours.
- * For cats, litter box, scoop, and litter
- * Blankets and/or towels
- * Pet beds and toys if you are able to take them.
- * Flashlight with extra batteries
- * Other useful items, if space allows are newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags, grooming items, and household bleach.



AFTER THE EMERGENCY

1. Survey the area inside and outside of your home to identify sharp objects, dangerous materials, wildlife, contaminated water, downed power lines and any other hazard.
2. In the first few days, leash your pet when they go outside. Familiar scents and landmarks may be altered and your pet may become confused. Some disasters will also cause wildlife to move from their usual areas. If your house has been damaged, you may need to crate or leash your animals inside the house to prevent their escape.
3. Allow uninterrupted rest/sleep for your pets to recover from the trauma and stress. Your pet's behavior may change after an emergency, so be patient with them. Try to get them back into their normal routines as soon as possible. If behavioral problems persist, or your pet seems to be having health problems, contact your veterinarian.

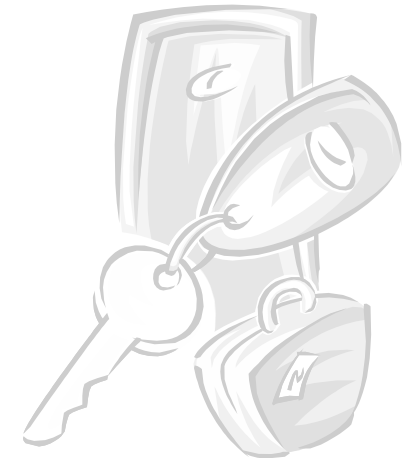
Pet Friendly Motels/Hotels

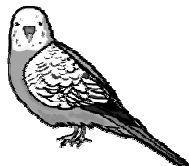
Before a Disaster

BE PREPARED

- * Assemble an animal EVACUATION KIT.
- * Develop an evacuation plan for all your animals.
- * Insure your pets have proper identification with either a collar or a microchip implant. Keep a collar and leash handy for control of your pet.
- * Keep a carrier for each pet, with the carrier marked with your pet's identification.
- * Keep your pet's vaccinations current, as well as a copy of the proof available.
- * Designate a willing neighbor to tend to your animals in case you are not home. This person should have a key, be familiar with your animals, and have access to your evacuation plan and supplies. Be sure to provide your veterinarian this person's information and a permission slip to put in your file at the vet's office authorizing this neighbor to get emergency treatment if necessary for your pet.
- * Identify places you can take your pet(s) should you have to evacuate.

IF YOU AREN'T HOME

- * Pre-place stickers on front and back doors at your residence to notify neighbors and emergency personnel about the animals that are on your property and where to find your evacuation supplies. Include the location of the animals and any of their favorite hiding spots to save time.
- * Provide muzzles, handling gloves, catchnets, and animal restraints where rescue personnel can find them.
